any human tendency to rely on earthly powers. The saints of the past found their defense in God alone, and the same promise holds for the present. This stanza reinforces the theme of divine sufficiency.

*"Before the hills in
order stood, / Or earth
received her frame, /
From everlasting thou
art God, / To endless
years the same."*

This is perhaps the

most theologically profound stanza. It directly draws from Psalm 90:2. The imagery of hills "in order stood" evokes the primordial creation, before any landmark existed. Watts declares God's existence before time itself—"from everlasting"—and His unchanging nature "to endless years the same." This stanza grounds the believer's hope not in shifting circumstances but in the immutable character of God. It is a powerful reminder that the One who was present before creation remains constant today.

Stanze 4:

The Brevity of Human Life

"A thousand ages in thy sight / Are like an evening gone; / Short as the watch that ends the night / Before the rising sun."

Watts now turns to the frailty of humanity. Using striking temporal imagery, he compares a thousand years to a single evening that passes quickly, or to a night watch—a period of about three hours in biblical times.
