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## **THE HISTORICAL ROOTS OF BORDER VIOLENCE**

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# Colonial Cartography and the Legacy of Division

The modern border system is a direct inheritance of European colonialism. At the Berlin Conference of 1884-85, European powers carved up Africa into territories with little regard for the people who lived there. Similar processes occurred in Asia, the Americas, and the Pacific. These arbitrary lines were drawn to facilitate resource extraction,

labor exploitation, and administrative control. Indigenous nations were fragmented, communities were separated, and new forms of identity and allegiance were imposed. determine who belongs and who does not.

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# The Global Border Regime: A System of Inequality

Today, border imperialism is maintained through a complex global regime of laws, technologies, and institutions. The Schengen Area, for example, allows free

movement for European citizens while simultaneously externalizing border control to countries in North Africa and the Middle East. The United States has built hundreds of miles of fencing along its southern border, deployed advanced surveillance technology, and implemented policies like the Migrant Protection Protocols (Remain in Mexico) that force asylum seekers to wait in dangerous conditions. Australia's "Pacific Solution" involves offshore detention centers that effectively outsource responsibility for refugees. These measures are not isolated; they are part of a coordinated system that channel

mobility and restrict the freedom of movement for the majority of the world's population.

A key aspect of border imperialism is the way it profits from human suffering. Private prison companies, defense contractors, and technology firms all benefit from the expanding border-industrial complex. **Undoing border imperialism** requires not only policy change but also challenging the economic interests that profit from division and exclusion.

## Environmental and Climate

## Dimensions

Border imperialism also intersects with environmental justice. As climate change accelerates, increasing numbers of people are displaced by drought, flooding, and other environmental disasters. Yet, the global border regime often prevents these climate migrants from seeking safety across national lines. Moreover, wealthy nations contribute disproportionately to carbon emissions while imposing strict border controls on those most affected by the resulting environmental changes. This ecological dimension of border imperialism

highlights the need for a holistic approach that connects

environmental justice, migration justice, and anti-colonial struggle.

**Undoing border imperialism** in this context means recognizing the right to mobility as a fundamental human right and a necessary response to ecological crisis.

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## Policy Reform and Legal

## Challenge

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One crucial arena for change is national and international policy. Advocates work to reform asylum laws, end detention practices, and expand legal pathways for migration. # Grassroots Movements and Community Organizing

At the grassroots level, communities around the world are organizing to resist border violence and build alternatives. Migrant rights organizations,

indigenous land defenders, and anti-deportation networks are creating solidarity economies, sanctuary spaces, and mutual aid systems that operate across borders. These movements often prioritize the leadership of those most directly affected by border imperialism, including undocumented migrants, refugees, and indigenous peoples. For example, the idea of "bioregionalism" proposes organizing societies around ecological regions rather than political boundaries.
