The title is not conferred lightly. As of today, the **Doctors of the Church list** includes 37 individuals. This number includes 17 men from the Western Church, 17 men from the Eastern Church, and 4 women. The list continues to grow, albeit slowly, as the Church recognizes new figures who meet the stringent criteria.

THE COMPLETE DOCTORS OF THE CHURCH LIST

Below is a carefully organized **Doctors of the Church list**, presented chronologically by era. This list is comprehensive and includes the year of their death and the year they were declared a Doctor of the Church. Each entry highlights the unique contribution of these extraordinary teachers.

Early Church Doctors (4th–8th centuries)

- **Saint John Chrysostom (c. 347–407) - Declared Doctor in 1568:** Renowned for his eloquent preaching, Chrysostom means "Golden-Mouthed." His commentaries on Scripture and his moral teaching have inspired generations.
- **Saint Ambrose (c. 340–397) - Declared Doctor in 1568:** A bishop of Milan, Ambrose influenced the development of Western liturgy and defended the Church's authority. He also baptized Saint Augustine.
- **Saint Augustine of Hippo (354–430) - Declared Doctor in 1298:** Arguably the most influential theologian in Western Christianity. His works *Confessions* and *City of God* remain essential reading.
- **Saint Jerome (c. 347–420) - Declared Doctor in 1298:** The great biblical scholar who translated the Bible into Latin (the Vulgate). His commentaries and

letters are invaluable.

- **Saint Gregory the Great (c. 540-604) - Declared Doctor in 1298:** A Pope and reformer, Gregory wrote extensively on pastoral care and was instrumental in developing Gregorian chant.

These eight figures form the core of the early **Doctors of the Church list**. They were formally recognized as a group by Pope Boniface VIII in 1298, establishing a precedent for future declarations.

Medieval Doctors (9th-15th centuries)

- **Saint Thomas Aquinas (c. 1225-1274) - Declared Doctor in 1567:** The "Angelic Doctor" is perhaps the most famous of all Doctors. His *Summa Theologica* is a monumental synthesis of Christian theology and Aristotelian philosophy.
- **Saint Bonaventure (c. 1217-1274) - Declared Doctor in 1588:** A Franciscan theologian and mystic, Bonaventure's works, such as *The Soul's Journey into God*, blend intellect and devotion.

The medieval Western Doctors emphasized reason and systematic theology, making them indispensable for anyone studying the history of Christian thought.

The Eastern Doctors (Patristic Era)

The **Doctors of the Church list** includes several figures from the Eastern Christian tradition, many of whom are also revered in the Orthodox Church. These Doctors are sometimes called the "Greek Fathers" and include:

- **Saint John Chrysostom (also counted among the Greek Doctors)** - Already listed above as a Doctor of the Church, he is included in both Eastern and Western lists.
- **Saint Gregory of Nazianzus** - Also included in the Greek list.
- **Saint Basil the Great** - Also included in the Greek list.
- **Saint Athanasius** - Also included in the Greek list.

In 1882, Pope Leo XIII added three more Eastern Doctors: Saints Cyril of Alexandria, Cyril of Jerusalem, and Epiphanius. This expanded the **Doctors of the Church list** and honored the shared heritage of East and West.

Women Doctors of the Church

One of the most remarkable developments in the modern era is the inclusion of women in the **Doctors of the Church list**. These four women are celebrated not only for their holiness but

for their profound theological and mystical writings. Their inclusion highlights the Church's recognition that sanctity and wisdom are not limited by gender.

- **Saint Teresa of Ávila (1515-1582) - Declared Doctor in 1970:** A Spanish Carmelite mystic and reformer, Teresa wrote *The Interior Castle* and *The Way of Perfection*, which are classics of mystical theology. She was the first woman declared Doctor of the Church.
- **Saint Catherine of Siena (1347-1380) - Declared Doctor in 1970:** A lay Dominican and mystic, Catherine was instrumental in convincing the Pope to return to Rome from Avignon. Her *Dialogue* is a masterpiece of spiritual literature.
- **Saint Thérèse of Lisieux (1873-1897) - Declared Doctor in 1997:** Known as the "Little Flower," Thérèse wrote *The Story of a Soul*, describing her "Little Way" of spiritual childhood. She was declared a Doctor for her teaching on divine love and mercy.
- **Saint Hildegard of Bingen (1098-1179) - Declared Doctor in 2012:** A German Benedictine abbess, Hildegard was a visionary, composer, naturalist, and theologian. Her works *Scivias* and
