## **Challenge 1: Coordinating Both Hands**

This is the most common difficulty for beginners. The solution is to practice each hand separately until each is solid, then combine them at a very slow tempo. Focus on the downbeat of each

measure as an anchor point.

## **Challenge 2: Remembering the Notes**

If you find yourself constantly looking at the letters, try to memorize short sections at a time. Cover the letters with a piece of paper and try to play from memory. This builds your internal musical map.

# Playing Smoothly

Canon in D should flow like water. If your playing sounds choppy, check your fingering. Use the thumb-under technique for scales and arpeggios. Also, ensure you are not lifting your fingers too high off the keys.

## Challenge 4: Staying Motivated

Progress can feel slow, but remember that every pianist started where you are now. Record yourself playing and compare after a week of practice to see

real improvement.
