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### THE GOLDEN RULES OF SIMPLIFICATION

A perfect square is a number that can be expressed as the product of an integer with itself (e.g., 4, 9, 16, 25, 36, 49, 64, 81, 100). When simplifying, your goal is to find the largest perfect square factor of the radicand and extract its root.

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### **STEP-BY-STEP: HOW TO APPROACH YOUR WORKSHEET**

Begin by factoring the number inside the radical. Do a prime factorization or simply list factors until you find a perfect square. ## Step 2: Apply the Product Property

Take the square root of the perfect square factor.  $\sqrt{36}$  is 6. Now you have  $6 * \sqrt{2}$ , which is written as  $6\sqrt{2}$ . This is the simplified form.

## Step 4: Check Your Work

A great way to check your answer is to square the coefficient (the number outside the radical) and multiply it by the radicand. For  $6\sqrt{2}$ , squaring 6 gives 36, and  $36 * 2$  equals 72. We have returned to our original radicand, confirming our simplification is

correct. This reverse check is invaluable when verifying

# I Square Roots

**Problem:** Simplify  $\sqrt{50}$ .

**Solution:** The largest perfect square factor of 50 is 25 (since  $25 * 2 = 50$ ). Therefore,  $\sqrt{50} = \sqrt{25} * \sqrt{2} = 5\sqrt{2}$ . Your worksheet answer should be  $5\sqrt{2}$ .

## Problem Type 2:

**Problem:** Simplify  $\sqrt{(x^9)}$ .

**Solution:** When

dealing with variables, the rule is simple: take half of the exponent.  $X^9$  means  $x * x * x \dots$  nine times. Half of 9 is 4.5, which we write as 4 with a remainder of 1. So,  $\sqrt{(x^9)} = x^4 * \sqrt{x}$ . We pulled out four pairs ( $x^8$ ) and have one  $x$  left inside. Your answer is  $x^4\sqrt{x}$ .

## Problem Type 3: Combination of Numbers and Variables

**Problem:** Simplify  $\sqrt{(48a^7b^3)}$ .

**Solution:** Let us break

this down piece by piece. For 48, the largest perfect square is 16 ( $48 = 16 * 3$ ), so we get  $\sqrt{16} * \sqrt{3} = 4\sqrt{3}$ . For  $a^7$ , half of 7 is 3 with a remainder of 1, so we get  $a^3\sqrt{a}$ . For  $b^3$ , half of 3 is 1 with a remainder of 1, so we get  $b\sqrt{b}$ . Now, multiply the outside parts together ( $4 * a^3 * b$ ) and the inside parts together ( $3 * a * b$ ). The final simplified answer is  $4a^3b\sqrt{(3ab)}$ .

## Problem Type 4: Simplifying Cube Roots

**Problem:** Simplify  $\sqrt[3]{(54)}$ .

**Solution:** Cube roots are different. We need to find perfect cubes (8, 27, 64, 125). The largest perfect cube factor of 54 is 27 ( $27 \cdot 2 = 54$ ). We apply the cube root to the perfect cube:  $\sqrt[3]{27} = 3$ . The leftover 2 remains inside the radical. The answer is  $3\sqrt[3]{2}$ .

## Problem Type 5: Rationaliz ing the Denomin ator

**Problem:** Simplify  $2 / \sqrt{3}$ .

**Solution:**

Mathematicians do not like radicals in the

denominator. To fix this, we multiply the numerator and denominator by the radical. Multiply both the top and bottom by  $\sqrt{3}$ . This gives  $(2\sqrt{3}) / (\sqrt{3} \cdot \sqrt{3})$ . Since  $\sqrt{3} \cdot \sqrt{3} = 3$ , the final answer is  $(2\sqrt{3}) / 3$ . Your worksheet answer should reflect this rationalized form.

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### COMMON PITFALLS AND HOW TO AVOID THEM

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Even with a solid understanding of the rules, certain mistakes are very common. Knowing what to watch for will help you ensure your **Simplifying Radical Expressions Worksheet Answers** are accurate.



# Forgetting the Product Property for Addition

Sometimes students find one perfect square and stop. For example, they might simplify  $\sqrt{32}$  to  $\sqrt{4} * \sqrt{8} = 2\sqrt{8}$ . While this is not wrong, it is not fully simplified because 8 has a perfect square factor of 4. Always check if the new radicand can be simplified further. The correct answer is  $4\sqrt{2}$ .

Remember that  $\sqrt{a + b}$  is **not** the same as  $\sqrt{a} + \sqrt{b}$ . This is a very common error. The product and quotient rules only apply to multiplication and division, not to addition or subtraction.

# Ignoring Absolute Value

# with Variables

In advanced algebra, when the index is even and the variable exponent is even, the simplified expression often requires an absolute value to ensure the result is non-negative. For a basic worksheet, you may not need this, but be aware that  $\sqrt{x^2} = |x|$ , not just  $x$ .
