This type of question measures your ability to visualize routes and cardinal directions, a critical skill for navigating New York City's grid system.

Example 4: Memory and Observation

Scenario: You are shown the following list of items for 10 seconds: "brown paper bag, green recycling bin, blue plastic crate, black trash can, orange traffic cone." After the 10 seconds, the list is hidden.

Question: Which of the following items was NOT on the list?

1. Black trash can
2. Orange traffic cone
3. Red fire extinguisher
4. Brown paper bag

Explanation: The original list contained a brown paper bag, green recycling bin, blue plastic crate, black trash can, and orange traffic cone. A "red fire extinguisher" was not on the list. The correct answer is **option C**. Memory questions assess your ability to recall information quickly and accurately, which is important for following instructions and identifying equipment on the job.

Example 5: Workplace Scenarios and Judgment

Scenario: You are a new sanitation worker on a collection route. You notice that a coworker is not wearing required safety gloves while handling broken glass and other sharp objects. What is the most appropriate action for you to take?
