3. Systems of Equations

Systems of linear equations require solving for two or more variables simultaneously. The two most common techniques are substitution and elimination.

Example Question (Substitution): Solve the system:

$$3x + 2y = 13$$

Systems often appear as word problems, so practice translating sentences into equations.

4. Polynomials and Factoring

You will need to add, subtract, multiply, and factor polynomials. Factoring is especially critical for solving higher-degree equations.

Example Question: Factor completely: $6x^2 + 11x - 10$

Answer: Subtract 4: $-2x > 6$. Divide by -2 and flip the sign: $x < -3$.

Example Question: Solve $|2x - 3| = 7$

Answer: Set up two equations: $2x - 3 = 7$ or $2x - 3 = -7$. For first: $2x = 10 \rightarrow x = 5$. For second: $2x = -4 \rightarrow x = -2$. Solutions: $x = 5$ or $x = -2$.
