Theatrical Nature and Cruise's Physicality

CHRISTIAN SLATER AS DANIEL

Christian Slater stepped into the role of Daniel Molloy, the reporter who interviews Louis. Originally, River Phoenix was cast but tragically died before filming began. Slater, a friend of Phoenix, took on the part as a tribute. His role is relatively small but crucial: he represents the audience, reacting with awe and horror to Louis's story. Slater's performance is understated but effective, showing a man gradually seduced by the vampire world. The framing device of the interview—set in a shabby San Francisco hotel room—is anchored by Slater's growing obsession, which mirrors the viewer's own

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fascination.

SUPPORTING CAST: BRINGING THE UNDEAD WORLD TO LIFE

In addition to the main stars, several supporting actors added depth to the **Interview With The Vampire movie cast**. Stephen Rea played Santiago, the sadistic vampire actor at the Théâtre des Vampires, whose theatrical cruelty made him a memorable antagonist. Sam Reid’s Lestat is more openly flamboyant than Cruise’s, while Jacob Anderson’s Louis is more assertive. Bailey Bass’s Claudia is older (14) and more aware of her predicament.
