

Priscilla Presley At Elvis Funeral

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THE DAY THAT CHANGED EVERYTHING: SETTING THE SCENE AT GRACELAND

August 16, 1977, began like any other summer day in Memphis, Tennessee. But by mid-afternoon, the world stopped turning. The news that Elvis Presley had died at Graceland, his beloved mansion, sent shockwaves across the globe. For Priscilla Presley, the former wife of the King of Rock and Roll, that phone call shattered her world a second time. She had divorced Elvis in 1973, yet their bond as co-parents to nine-year-old Lisa Marie and as friends had only grown stronger in the years that followed. When she arrived at Graceland that evening, she stepped into a maelstrom of grief, media frenzy, and the immense responsibility of organizing a funeral befitting a legend – all while shouldering her own profound sorrow. THE SHOCK AND THE JOURNEY: PRISCILLA RECEIVES THE NEWS

Priscilla Presley was at her home in Los Angeles when the call came. She was living a relatively private life, focusing on raising Lisa Marie and pursuing her own interests in acting and business. The sudden death of Elvis – at the age of 42, from cardiac arrest – was utterly unexpected. While the world mourned a superstar, Priscilla mourned the father of her child and the man she had loved since she was a teenager. She immediately booked a flight to Memphis.

Arriving at Graceland, Priscilla was faced with a chaotic scene. Fans had already begun to gather outside the gates, sobbing and lighting candles. The mansion was filled with family, close friends, and staff in shock. Elvis's father, Vernon Presley, was devastated. Priscilla quickly assumed a leadership role, not out of a desire for control, but out of necessity. She knew the family needed someone to steady the ship, and she was uniquely positioned – as the mother of the sole heir and as a woman who understood both Elvis's public persona and his private vulnerabilities.

PRISCILLA PRESLEY'S ROLE IN THE FUNERAL ARRANGEMENTS

In the immediate hours following Elvis's death, Priscilla Presley became the central figure in planning the funeral. She worked tirelessly alongside Vernon and the family's trusted aides. One of her most deeply personal decisions was choosing the attire in which Elvis would be buried. She selected a white three-piece suit, a blue shirt, and a silver tie – an outfit that reflected the pristine, almost angelic image she wanted the world to remember. She also personally selected the solid copper casket, a heavy, dignified vessel that would later be interred in Graceland's Meditation Garden.

Priscilla also decided to allow a public viewing at Graceland on the day of the funeral. Knowing the profound connection Elvis had with his fans, she felt it was important to give them a final chance to pay their respects. This decision was not without controversy, as many close friends felt the service should remain completely private. Yet Priscilla insisted, and her compassion for the mourning public set the tone for the events to come.

A Mother's Instinct: Protecting Lisa Marie

Throughout the entire ordeal, Priscilla's primary focus was her daughter. Lisa Marie was only nine years old, and her father's sudden death was incomprehensible. Priscilla kept her close, shielding her from the worst of the media circus while ensuring she understood the reality of the moment. She later wrote in her memoir, "Elvis and Me," that she wanted Lisa Marie to have the chance to say goodbye in her own way. This maternal instinct guided every decision Priscilla made during those dark days.

THE PRIVATE FUNERAL SERVICE: A MORNING OF GRACE AND GRIEF

The private funeral service for Elvis Presley was held on the morning of August 18, 1977, in the foyer of Graceland. The room was filled with tropical flowers, a testament to Elvis's love for Hawaii, and a small choir sang gospel hymns. About 200 family members and close friends attended. Priscilla Presley at Elvis funeral was both the anchor and the most visibly heartbroken presence.

Wearing a simple black dress and a black veil that partially obscured her face, Priscilla entered the foyer holding Lisa Marie's hand. She guided her daughter to the open casket, where they spent several moments in private farewell. Priscilla leaned in, touched Elvis's face, and whispered words that only Elvis could hear. It was a profoundly intimate moment in front of a hushed room. She then placed a small object – later reported to be a lock of her hair and a note – inside the casket. This gesture became one of the most emotional and defining moments of the service.

Priscilla did not deliver a formal eulogy, but her presence spoke volumes. She sat in the front row, clutching a handkerchief, her shoulders occasionally trembling with silent sobs. Family friends recalled that she displayed remarkable composure, even as she was crumbling inside. She was the rock for Lisa Marie and for Vernon, who was barely able to function. When the service ended with a recorded version of Elvis singing "How Great Thou Art," Priscilla remained seated for a long moment, unwilling to leave.

THE PUBLIC VIEWING AND THE FUNERAL PROCESSION

Following the private service, Graceland opened its gates for a public viewing. More than 30,000 fans had lined up outside, some having waited through the night. Priscilla agreed to allow the casket to be placed near the front door so that fans could file through the front foyer and pay their last respects. For several hours, they walked past the King, many leaving flowers, stuffed animals, and handwritten notes.

Priscilla watched from an upstairs window, observing the outpouring of love. She was later seen walking down the

driveway, arm in arm with a family friend, to greet some of the fans directly. This act of connection, of shared mourning, solidified her role not just as Elvis's ex-wife, but as the guardian of his legacy. The funeral procession that followed took Elvis from Graceland to Forest Hill Cemetery. Priscilla rode in the lead limousine with Vernon and Lisa Marie. Millions of people lined the streets of Memphis, a river of grief that stretched for miles. Priscilla's face, framed by the car window, was a portrait of dignified sorrow – an image captured by photographers that became iconic.

THE BURIAL AND THE FINAL GOODBYE

At Forest Hill Cemetery, the family gathered for a brief burial service. It was here that Priscilla Presley at Elvis funeral made another lasting impression. As the casket was lowered, she took a single white rose from the arrangement and placed it on top. She then led Lisa Marie away, her arm firmly around her daughter's shoulders. The burial was initially intended to be a permanent resting place, but due to security concerns and the relentless stream of fans, Priscilla later spearheaded the moving of Elvis's remains to Graceland's Meditation Garden in October 1977.

This decision was emblematic of Priscilla's long-term thinking even in the midst of acute grief. She understood that Graceland needed to become a place where the family could privately mourn and where fans could continue to honor Elvis without disturbing his peace. The Meditation Garden, now the final resting place of Elvis, Vernon, and Gladys Presley, as well as Lisa Marie, is a direct result of Priscilla's vision and determination.

THE AFTERMATH: PRISCILLA PRESLEY AS THE

GUARDIAN OF THE LEGACY

In the weeks and months following the funeral, Priscilla Presley faced a new challenge: preserving and building the Elvis Presley empire. She had to navigate legal battles, business decisions, and her own grief. But the strength she displayed at the funeral carried her forward. She opened Graceland to the public in 1982, transforming it into one of the most visited private homes in America. This decision was initially criticized by some as commercialism, but Priscilla saw it as a way to keep Elvis's spirit alive and to provide for their daughter.

The image of Priscilla Presley at Elvis funeral – the veiled widow, the grieving mother, the composed leader – became the foundation of her public identity. She was no longer just the teenage bride of a rock star. She was a woman of substance, capable of immense grace under pressure. In interviews years later, she often cited that day as the moment she truly grew up. "I had to be strong for Lisa Marie," she said. "I couldn't fall apart because she needed me."

PRISCILLA'S REFLECTIONS ON THAT DAY IN HER OWN WORDS

In her 1985 memoir "Elvis and Me" and in numerous interviews, Priscilla has offered glimpses into her thoughts during the funeral. She described the surreal quality of the day: seeing the face she had loved for so long frozen in peaceful stillness, hearing the crowd wailing outside, and feeling the weight of being the focal point of a global tragedy. She admitted that she felt a strange relief that his suffering had ended, as Elvis had struggled with prescription drug abuse and declining health. But that relief was overshadowed by an overwhelming sense of loss.
