The books blended elements of thriller, mystery, and contemporary drama, creating a genre that publishers would later label "thriller lit" for young adults.

Key Themes in the Series

THE TELEVISION ADAPTATION AND CULTURAL IMPACT

In 2010, Freeform (then ABC Family) premiered the television adaptation of

Pretty Little Liars, starring Troian Bellisario, Ashley Benson, Lucy Hale, and Shay Mitchell. The show ran for seven seasons, becoming one of the network's highest-rated programs. While the television series diverged significantly from the books in terms of plot and character development, it introduced the story to a new, broader audience. For many fans, the show was their first introduction to **Pretty Little Liars author Sara Shepard**, leading them to seek out the original novels.

The cultural impact of both the books and the show cannot be overstated. They influenced fashion, slang, and the way young adult thrillers were marketed. The concept of a mysterious antagonist who communicates through text messages and social media felt timely and innovative. The series also opened the door for other young adult thriller series, such as *The Thousandth Floor* by Katharine McGee and *One of Us Is Lying* by Karen M.
