Ignition System

The CDI then fires the ignition coil, which steps up the voltage to fire the spark plug. Charging System

The AC output from the stator passes through a **voltage regulator/rectifier** that converts it to DC and regulates the voltage to around 13.5–14.5 volts. The wiring diagram will show the three yellow wires (typical) from the stator to the regulator, then the regulator output to the battery positive and ground. A failing regulator can cause overcharging or undercharging.

Lighting and Accessories

The 2000 Trailblazer 250 typically has a headlight (high/low beam), taillight, and brake light. Some models may have a DC power outlet. The lighting circuit can be powered directly from the stator AC (without the battery) or from the battery. The diagram clarifies which wire feeds the headlight switch and how the brake light switch (normally open) completes the circuit when the brake pedal is pressed.

Switches and Safety Interlocks

Polaris included a **kill switch** (often on the handlebar) and a **tether kill switch** (lanyard). These are in series with the CDI ground circuit. COMMON WIRING ISSUES ON THE 2000 POLARIS TRAILBLAZER 250

1. **No Spark** – The most common problem. Check the kill switch and tether switch first. Then inspect the CDI connections, stator trigger coil resistance (typically 100–200 ohms), and the ignition coil. The wiring diagram will show the test points.

5. **Intermittent Electrical Failures** – Often caused by corroded connectors, cracked wires near the steering stem, or a broken ground strap. The diagram helps you identify all ground points.

STEP-BY-STEP TROUBLESHOOTING USING THE WIRING DIAGRAM

No Spark: A Practical Example

Let's use the wiring diagram to solve a no-spark condition on a 2000 Trailblazer 250.

1. **Verify kill switches:** According to the diagram, the black/white wire from the CDI goes to the kill switch. With the multimeter on continuity, check that the circuit is open when the switch is in the RUN position and closed when in OFF position.
2. **Check the stator trigger coil:** The diagram shows the trigger coil wires (usually green/white and green/black) from the stator to the CDI. Disconnect the CDI, measure resistance between those wires. It should be around 120–150 ohms. If open or shorted, replace the stator.
3. **Check the ignition coil primary:** With the CDI output wire (orange/white) to the coil primary, measure resistance between the primary terminal and ground. Typically less than 1 ohm. If open, replace the coil.
4. **Test the CDI power:** The diagram shows a 12V supply from the battery (via the ignition switch) to the CDI. With the ignition on, probe the red wire at the CDI harness for 12V. If missing, check the ignition switch and fuse.
