These medications are generally reserved for cases that significantly impact quality of life.

Botox Injections for Severe Spasms

For a more severe form of eye twitching called benign essential blepharospasm, Botox (botulinum toxin) injections are the gold standard treatment. Tiny amounts of Botox are injected into the affected eyelid muscles. This temporarily paralyzes the muscles, preventing them from contracting. The effects usually last for three to four months, after which repeat injections are needed. This is a highly effective treatment for chronic, debilitating twitching but is not typically recommended for the common, temporary myokymia that most people experience.

While rare, eye twitching can sometimes be a symptom of a neurological condition. You should contact a doctor immediately if you notice any of the following:
